

A YEAR IN REVIEW

Dear Friends,

With the new year ahead, I invite you to reflect on the progress we made together this year.

With your help, new immigrants have a stronger sense of home in their new communities, more businesses are open in our small towns, and rural people across the country are making their voices heard.

Before you flip through the pages to see all you helped accomplish in 2016, I'd like to share a few of my favorites:

You and I both know that small towns are rich in history and culture. Our storefront theater project in our hometown of Lyons, Neb., won recognition from Americans for the Arts, a national program that recognizes the most compelling public art. Together we're proving that small towns everywhere are interesting places.

Your support helped us offer small business owners a hand up. In 2016, we placed \$1.7 million in loan capital with 123 small town businesses. This included \$470,350 lent to Latino entrepreneurs. This is money invested directly in our small towns.

Your voice helped lay the groundwork for a national campaign to reform crop insurance, bringing together farmers and partners from across the nation. We'll look to you again in the new year to help drive this campaign forward.

This coming year is sure to bring a new set of challenges for rural

America and the people who call it home. We'll face these challenges
head-on, and with you by our side, I'm confident that we'll turn challenges into opportunity again in 2017.


YOUR 2016 ACCOMPLISHMENTS

- Sat down with 35 policymakers in Nebraska, across the Midwest and in Washington, D.C. to make sure your voice is heard in policy debates. Some of you joined us on these visits. Thank you!
- Exceeded \$14 million in small business lending in the history of the Center. Each loan represents a hard working entrepreneur working to create opportunity and a vibrant community.
- Worked to rebuild food systems on two reservations, assisting 150 families with gardens, 80 local members with market vending, and hosting over 2,200 customers at a local market.
- Launched an effort to connect beginning farmers to retiring farmers with expiring federal farm conservation contracts. The project will expand use of a provision you helped win in the 2014 Farm Bill.
- Hosted three Women's Learning Circles with 42 participants focusing on soil health, greenhouses and livestock management.
 Women are leaders in expanding conservation practices on farmland.

- Launched a new loan to provide financing up to \$150,000, and created a new credit builder loan to give everyone the chance to build good credit history. This was based on input from loan clients.
- Laid the groundwork for a campaign to win reforms in the upcoming farm bill debate to invest in conservation, give beginning farmers a hand up, and boost rural development programs.
- Enrolled nearly 10 million acres in the Conservation Stewardship Program, a federal farm conservation program you helped win. That's 2.3 million more acres than last year's sign-up.
- Provided coaching to 50 Latino beginning farmers. Three received USDA loans for land or equipment, sparking widespread interest among other Latino farmers in their communities.
- Hosted the play "Map of My Kingdom" about farmland transfer. Following the play, local farm families exploring their own farm transitions engaged in dialogue with one another.

- Hosted the Midwest Farm to School Conference with 150 participants from five states, a network working together to boost local farm sales and increase healthy food on school lunch trays.
- Led a five-state network working to develop clean energy infrastructure in ways that reflect local priorities and that address community concerns.
- Worked alongside you and in partnership with allies to close the health insurance gap that leaves 2.6 million Americans without health insurance.
- Reached 2,372 businesses with planning, accounting and marketing training. More than 63 percent were women, 48 percent Latino, and 75 percent low to moderate income. We work where the need is greatest.
- Reached out to lawmakers to support legislation strengthening rural hospital funding, in response to data showing 76 rural hospitals closed since 2010, and that onethird of rural hospitals are suffering financial distress.


